## NEW YORK A. C. REGATTA.

Large Crowd Sees Races Rowed on

Travers Island Course.

The annual rowing regatta of the New York Athletic Club oarsmen, which was held at Travers Island yesterday afternoon, brought out a large crowd of spectators and furnished a series of close and interesting races. The banks near the boat-

house as well as the verandas of the house were lined with people, and with the Travers Island Creek alive with launches and a few yachts, the picturesque scene presented was similar to

that of many larger regattas. The eight-oared senior race attracted, as usual, the greatest interest. But few looked for as close a struggle as the three-quarter-mile event proved to be from start to finish. At the pistol shot

Tracy's and Higgins's octets jumped to the lead of the other starters. For nearly half the distance of the race these two crews fought it out on even terms.

crews fought it out on even terms. The race then began to look like Higgins's combination as victors, when Barney, at bow, caught a crab, giving the rival eight over half a length lead. This they kept until the others at the finish made a fine spurt, which, however, only succeeded in reducing the lead Tracy's octet had to a quarter of a length.

Another event on the programme which brought the spectators to their feet was the four-oared races, some of the heats

brought the spectators to their feet was the four-oared races, some of the heats proving to be of nearly as much interest as the final. Among the carsmen that figured in these were Frank Hooper, who a few years ago rowed at bow in the Cornell 'Varsity eight, and J. A. Mc-Kenna, who during his academic career rowed in the Cornell and Harvard squads. In the final heat the crew of B. W. King captured the lead at the start increasing it to a length of open water at the finish. The time of this race, 2 minutes 461-5 seconds, was but four seconds slower than the time made by the senior eights.

Durando Miller was expected to start in the singles, but owing to sickness he

in the singles, but owing to sickness he did not appear. In his absence C. Kusche walked off with the event, with three and a half lengths of open water to the good.

As a special event, a fancy diving contest was run in after the four-oared races.

In this F. Mullen, the ex-City College diver, was scratch, but was beaten out by Eugene Kelly, who had a handicap of ten points. of ten points. Mullen's front dive from the 32-foot height was about the best exhibition given, though Kelly got in some good work in his back and jack diving.
